<b>DESCRIPTION</b>	The Book of the Prophet Isaiah is one of the more fascinating and complex books of the Old Testament. For the Early Christian Community it proved to be a fruitful source of material for its theological reflection on the Church, the Mother of God, and especially the person and mission of Jesus Christ. This course will provide a review of the spectrum of hermeneutical principles in the Church, and analyse their presence in the interpretation of the book of Isaiah, moving from the tradition of reading Isaiah within the Holy Scriptures, to Patristic, liturgical and modern readings of the prophetic book, with particular emphasis on the Eastern Christian Tradition. In particular, this course will offer an opportunity for cross-fertilisation, given its interdisciplinary nature, combining the interests of both the Eastern Christian and Biblical concentrations.
<b>OBJECTIVES</b>	The broader objective of this course is to develop and refine hermeneutical tools for the interpretation of Scripture in a way that integrates the contribution of modern biblical scholarship with the hermeneutical Tradition of the Church through the ages.
<b>WORKLOAD</b>	Weekly readings of approximately 30-50 pages Written Assignments: - Theological Word Study on particular term in Isaiah (5-7 pages) - Lectionary study: the use of Isaiah in a particular liturgical tradition (readings compiled in table format, 2 pages of interpretation) Hermeneutical-exegetical exercise on a particular verse or pericope from Isaiah quoted in the N.T. (11-12 pages)
